Invite your best Nature Haiku and/or Tanka entries by May 5, 2024

Your Haiku (and/or Tanka) entries should be ready for display. If sending by mail, use 8.5" x 11" paper. Feel free to include your original nature art to illustrate the Haiku and/or Tanka. Select entries will be displayed at the 2024 Asian Celebration in Eugene.

All entries will also be considered for publication in the Autumn 2024 issue of *Skipping Stones* and on our website. Haiku and Tanka (short song, in Japanese) are both traditional poetry forms that come from Japan.

- ★ Haiku consists of three lines. The first line and third line both have five syllables and the middle line has seven (*But we will not be very strict*).
- ★ Haiku appeals to the senses (sight, sound, smell, taste, touch) and it touches the heart.
- ★ Tanka is a 31-syllable poem and has 5 lines with 5/7/5/7/7 syllable count, respectively.
- ★ Nature art can accompany your haiku or Tanka, and it is encouraged!
- ★ With your entries, please provide this information (on the backside of your printed paper copy):
- ★ Include your full name and grade or age, your teacher's and school's name, your/your teacher's e-mail and mailing address. Haiku entries must be sent by 5 pm on Sunday, the 5th of May 2024 to:
